2013 VTA Annual General Meeting by Susan Graham

October 26 was the date of this year's AGM, held at Bruce Bay Cottages and Lighthouse in Bruce Mines, and attended by 31 people. The Coordinating Council (CC) met in the morning, and then everyone joined us in the lounge for lunch, supplied by owner Pat Peterson and her helper. Pat had arranged for a cake decorated in the VTA colours of blue and yellow to celebrate our 40th anniversary – nice touch! We arrived in the morning to a roaring blaze in the puddingstone fireplace, overlooking the lake. It was hard to buckle down to business instead of just kicking back and enjoying the room. But buckle down we did; here are some of the highlights from both meetings.

Our long-awaited Risk Management Plan has now been received, and Carole Blaquiere is revising it with input from the CC. Hike Ontario will hopefully receive the finished plan in December.

40th Anniversary events are underway, with the Saulteaux and Coureurs de Bois clubs having held celebrations already, and the challenge hikes are underway, as is the photo contest.

President Susan Graham reported the Trans Canada Trail (TCT) has decided on a "blueway" (canoe/kayak) route between Sault Ste. Marie and the Manitoba border as the route of the TCT in order to meet their deadline of 2017 for connecting the trail along its length. In looking at the route east of Sault Ste. Marie, TCT was undecided as to whether to support the proposed cycling route between Sudbury and the Soo, or trying to link Spanish and Sudbury via land-based trail and "blueway". In light of the fact that there are long distances to maintain by so few volunteers, a motion was passed indicating the VTA would support the cycling route as the main route (or spine) of the TCT, and our trail, or sections of it, could be designated as secondary trails.

Clubs reported that overall, the trail is in decent shape, having had maintenance done on a wide area this year. The Nor'Wester club in Thunder Bay still supports the Kinghorn trail development, although new sources of funding would need to be found to proceed, as TCT will not be funding large projects like that one. The Pic River First Nation has made trail improvements from Pic River to Heron Bay, and recently held a grand opening.

Election of Officers produced several new faces to positions. Carole Blaquiere is the new President, with Kirsten Spence as VP West, and Patricia Wynter as VP East. The newsletter has a couple of new faces on the team: Fiona Ortiz as Editor, with assistance from Paula Dunning. Dawn Elmore remains in her capacity of layout. The position of Recording Secretary remains vacant, and it is important that it be filled. Susan thanked Cheryl Landmark in absence for her work as Editor. Susan was in turn thanked for her years on the CC, and she and her husband, Cliff, were wished well as they move on to some other things to start Cliff's retirement.

The Steve Taylor award was presented to Steve Dominy, for his efforts in heading up the 40th Anniversary team, and his organization of the trail maintenance blitz in particular. Steve reported that 76 km of trail saw improvement in the two periods (May and August).

Draws for free 1-year memberships were held, with the winners being Gerry Jean, Steve Dominy and Steve Bailey.

The meeting adjourned and most headed out for a walk. The wet weather made us abandon the original plan of going to the Rock Lake lookout, so we first tried the trails on the Bruce Bay property, but they were also too wet and slippery or too muddy. We ended up on Copper Bay Road, walking and chatting and having a fine time regardless! An overall successful day. Several of us decided not to go home that day, and stayed overnight in order to enjoy an Indian food buffet for supper, followed by Carole and Chris' pictures of their trip to Ireland in June, then join in the hike on Sunday in conjunction with the Sault Naturalists in the Shaw Dam area. Good food, social time and hiking all came together to make it a fine weekend! See you next year.



Changes to Version 4.1 of the Voyageur Hiking Trail Guidebook

A revised version of the Guidebook is scheduled for release in spring 2014 (Version 4.0 came out 7 years ago). The maps have been updated to reflect current information, including new boundaries for conservation areas and First Nations, updated road conditions and corrected road names. Of particular interest to hikers are trail reroutes, closures, additions, etc. - following is a list of these principal changes. In addition, GPS coordinates (latitude and longitude) have been added for all trail access points.

Any member wishing to pre-order Version 4.1 of the Guidebook can do so at the price of \$25.00 (maximum 2 per member). Shipping and handling is an additional \$10, or you can save the postage by arranging to pick up your order from a member of the Coordinating Council (see back page of newsletter).

Casque Isles Section: Abyond Loop trail has been closed.

Marathon Section: New loop trail north of the Pic River, forming part of the new Kewis Canning Trail and Boardwalk system.

Lake Superior Prov. Park: Awausee Trail added to map.

Pancake Bay Provincial Park: The two park trails – Nature Trail and Lookout Trail – have been added to the guidebook (map and brief description).

Stokely Section: 1) New loop trail near Robertson Cliffs.

2) Access point A3 has been moved to McGaughan Rd. (winter access is not permitted).

Goulais Section: Trail no longer starts at Witry Rd. -3.5 km of main trail has been closed, and former access point A2 (Hwy. 552) is now the starting point.

Saulteaux Section: 1) New side trail (access) at W terminus of Hwy. 550 (turnaround) in Gros Cap.

2) New Walls Lake Loop Trail.

3) Main trail closed between Walls Lake and Creek Rd.

4) Trail rerouted from Old Goulais Bay Rd. north to reach McIntyre Lake – no longer crosses Root River. (work in progress) 5) New Hiawatha Loop Trail.

6) New Mabel Lake Loop Trail with side trail to Crystal Lake.

7) HUB Trail route has been updated.

Echo Ridges Section: Trail rerouted to now meet 1) the S end of Maud Lake (new side trail) and

2) a falls on Maud Creek.

Thessalon Section: 1) Trail rerouted west of Shaw Rd.

2) Side trail to Long Lake removed.

3) Trail between Clubhouse Rd. and eastern terminus on Melwel Rd. rerouted onto Melwel Rd.

Penewobikong Section: 1) Loop trail added at Fire Tower Mountain, replacing side trail.

2) Blue side trail overlooking Granary Lake now added to map.

Voyageur Trail Association Acquires SPOT Devices

The VTA has purchased three SPOT Satellite GPS Messenger devices for use by outing leaders. The Coordinating Council recently agreed that outing leaders hiking in remote areas, particularly where this is no cellular phone coverage, should be given the option to carry a SPOT.

The SPOT is a one-way communication device that sends 4 types of messages (three of which can be pre-scripted by the user) along with the hiker's GPS coordinates. Messages can be sent to up to 10 recipients in the form of an email, text message, Facebook posting or Twitter feed. The recipient of the message would be able to produce a map showing the hiker's location by clicking on the URL provided in the message. In the event of a life-threatening or critical emergency, pressing the 'SOS' button would notify emergency services of your location and that help is needed.

Currently, the Coureurs de Bois, Penewobikong and Saulteaux clubs have a SPOT. Any active club is entitled to purchase a SPOT for use on their outings – the VTA will cover the purchase price and annual service fee.

I would like to take the opportunity to introduce myself and to let you know what I would like to do as the incoming president of the Voyageur Trail Association. 
