

AGM Report by Carole Blaquiere

We had 12 attendees to the AGM which was held at the Legion in Schrieber on September 24th. In addition to the VTA president and membership secretary, six VTA members of the Casque Iles club, two volunteers and representatives from the town of Schrieber, Terrace Bay and the Lake Superior Marine Conservation Area attended.

Kees and Janice were acclaimed in their positions of treasurer and volunteer coordinator respectively. No one volunteered for the position of publicity. After the business of the AGM was completed, we had an excellent SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) session in which many ideas were generated for the strategic planning committee. This is the second year that we included a SWOT exercise after the AGM business and both have generated much discussion. I plan on continuing this practice for future AGMs.

Lunch was served, after which we headed out on a lovely hike from Lyda Bay to Terrace Bay Beach along the Casque Iles Trail. This was an excellent opportunity to meet with the new people on the Casque Iles executive as well as to re-establish ties with the long time members.

Since we were in the area, we took some time to meet with other stakeholders in the area, including Dean Main, Community Development Manager in Terrace Bay on Friday the 23rd, Sylvio Pelletier, Acting Manager, LSMCA, Ron Salo and Ashley of the Northwest Superior CFDC on Monday the 25th and Bob Hancherow, Economic Development Manager in Marathon on Tuesday the 26th. The purpose of the meeting was to increase the awareness of the VTA and to determine what relationships could be developed in the area.

There is a Northwest Trail Association being developed through the EDOs of the towns from Marathon to Dorion. This entity is still trying to determine what its mandate will be and has started working on a pamphlet

which will have selected trails from each of the communities. Matt Borustski has already indicated to the group that they should involve the actual people who are developing and maintaining the trails in the area which I believe is going to be done. The next meeting is going to be held in November.

We stayed at a lovely little cottage that I had booked on Walker Lake in Schrieber. Since the owners decided not to charge the VTA for the lodgings due to some mishaps, we donated a guidebook which can be used both by the owners and any future guests they have at the cottage.

Hike Ontario Annual Summit Report by Carole Blaquiere





Chris Kuntz and Carole Blaquiere attended this year's Hike Ontario summit held in Perth, Ontario, which allowed for networking with the Rideau Trail Association (RTA) club members from Ottawa, Perth and Kingston areas. Members of southern Ontario clubs such as the Thames Valley, Avon, Guelph, Lambton Shores, and Meaford areas were also in attendance.

The keynote speakers were Doug Knapp, who spoke about the creation and early years of both Hike Ontario and the RTA, and Ron Knight from the Bighead River Heritage Association who spoke about John Muir, celebrated naturalist who travelled through and worked in Ontario as a young man. Doug Knapp was instrumental in the creation of Hike Ontario and the RTA. Although he remembers much, he admitted the needed to refresh his memories by searching the archives at Queens University. Of note to the VTA, Paul Syme (see page three for list of original hikers)*, one of our founding members, was part of the group founding the original Hike Ontario organization which was called FOHTA (Federation of Ontario Hiking Trail Associations). Mr. Knapp asked about Mr. Syme and was glad to hear that he was still a member of the VTA.

I attended an information session "Using Digital Media to Promote Hiking" with Paul Galipeau. Paul works in communications as a consultant and previously worked for Parks Canada at the Rideau Canal as a communications specialist. He currently volunteers as the RTA as publicity. When he began the RTA, website and social media pages were trending up in usage but membership was trending down. He believed that using social media and revamping the communication strategy, including the website could align the two trends upwards. The RTA has recently launched a new website that includes new branding and revised logo. The new website is also mobile friendly and has a member only portal.

Mailchimp is used to send a monthly members-only hiking e-letter which includes special announcements and upcoming hikes. They also launched a monthly public e-newsletter, sent to complimentary members as well as lapsed members and non-members that indicate they want to be on their mailing list. They are no longer sending out physical newsletters to any of their members.

In addition to using Facebook and meetups to indicate weekend hikes, they use Instagram to publish pictures and short videos of their events. They monitor Twitter to answer questions about the trails and association. They also monitor metadata, the data associated with the usage of these communication systems. The result of all of this work is impressive: in just one year, the membership trend has not only reversed but now number more than the last 3 or 4 years. Membership retention is 77%, the highest in the last 10 years. New members are surveyed to find out why they are joining and how they learned about the organization. All of this is food for thought for the VTA.

Overview of the Supporting Ontario's Trails Act, 2016

- Ontario has passed legislation to improve and sustain Ontario's urban, suburban, rural and remote land and water trails.
- The Supporting Ontario's Trails Act, 2016 will help the trails community more effectively develop, operate and promote trails while enhancing the trails experience for all trail users.
- Ontario is home to over 80,000 kilometres of trails that support recreation, tourism and transportation (including active transportation).
- Each year, millions of Ontarians and visitors from outside the province experience the province's world class trails system.
- Trails encourage explorers of all ages and abilities to visit our unique communities and support local economies and jobs.
- The province is committed to providing accessible opportunities for active living, recreation and tourism on Ontario's trails for people of all abilities.
- From 2009 through 2015, the province invested \$130 million in both direct and indirect funding to support Ontario's trails.
- The province is also investing more than \$3.5 million in trails which will include adding more than 250 kilometres of trails through Ontario's Pan American/Parapan American Games Promotion, Celebration and Legacy Strategy.
- In 2014, hiking expenditures by Ontarians added \$559 million to Ontario's GDP and created more than 18,000 jobs across the province with an annual economic benefit of nearly \$1.4 billion.

Voyageur Trail Club supports its members by paying their expenses to take a one-day-long Hike Ontario Leadership course if you lead for the club.



Celebrate Canada's 150th...in a big canoe!

Several Voyageur Trail Club members participated in a very successful two-day paddle involving two Montreal and two North canoes from Sault Ste. Marie to Fort St. Joseph in 2012. We had a great time, learned a lot about local history and were treated superbly by residents along the route. We plan to do it again in 2017: the "Sault Ste. Marie Brigade" will consist of at least one Montreal canoe and two North canoes.

On June 29, 2017 the Sault Ste. Marie Brigade will depart Batchewana Bay bound for Goulais River. On June 30 the brigade will paddle from Goulais River to the Sault Ste. Marie Canal National Historic Site. On July 1 we will paddle through the locks at Sault Ste. Marie Canal National Historic Site as part of their Canada Day "Parade of Paddles" festivities (local paddlers in canoes/kayaks will join the flotilla for this event). The Brigade will continue via Lake George to Womens' Institute Park at Richards Landing. On July 2, 2017 we will pass Sailor's Encampment to Fort St. Joseph. We will participate in a Parks Canada event at Fort St. Joseph on July 3 and then we will head to Hilton Beach. On July 4 the brigade will paddle from Hilton Beach, visit Bruce Mines and finish in Thessalon.

Watch the Voyageur Trail Association outing schedule for "practice" paddling events in May and June. The 2017 Sault Ste. Marie Canoe Brigade is one of twelve brigades being organized across Canada under the umbrella of the Canadian Voyageur Brigade Society (CVBS). Find out more at:
