SCHREIBER CHANNEL PROVINCIAL NATURE RESERVE

The Schreiber Channel Provincial Nature Reserve located approximately 6 km southwest of Schreiber, was designated as a Provincial Nature Reserve on March 7, 1979 under the Provincial Parks Act and encompasses an area of about 12 hectares.

Provincial Nature Reserves are one of six park classes established under the Provincial Parks Act for the purpose of protecting significant natural features. The Schreiber Channel reserve includes a highly significant geological feature illustrating ancient life forms which evolved in a particular environment approximately 1.6 billion years ago. As a Provincial Nature Reserve, the site will be managed for scientific research, outdoor education and low intensity recreation. The Voyageur Trail passes through this site and the Provincial Parks Act prohibits the collection of fossils and other materials without the written permission of the Minister of Natural Resources.

We would like to stress the need to protect this area and maintain it in its natural state for educational and research purposes. It has international significance and is unique and therefore requires a high level of co-operation in protecting it. Remember the Trail Users' Code - Take nothing but pictures - leave nothing but your thanks!

STATUS OF THE GUIDE BOOK

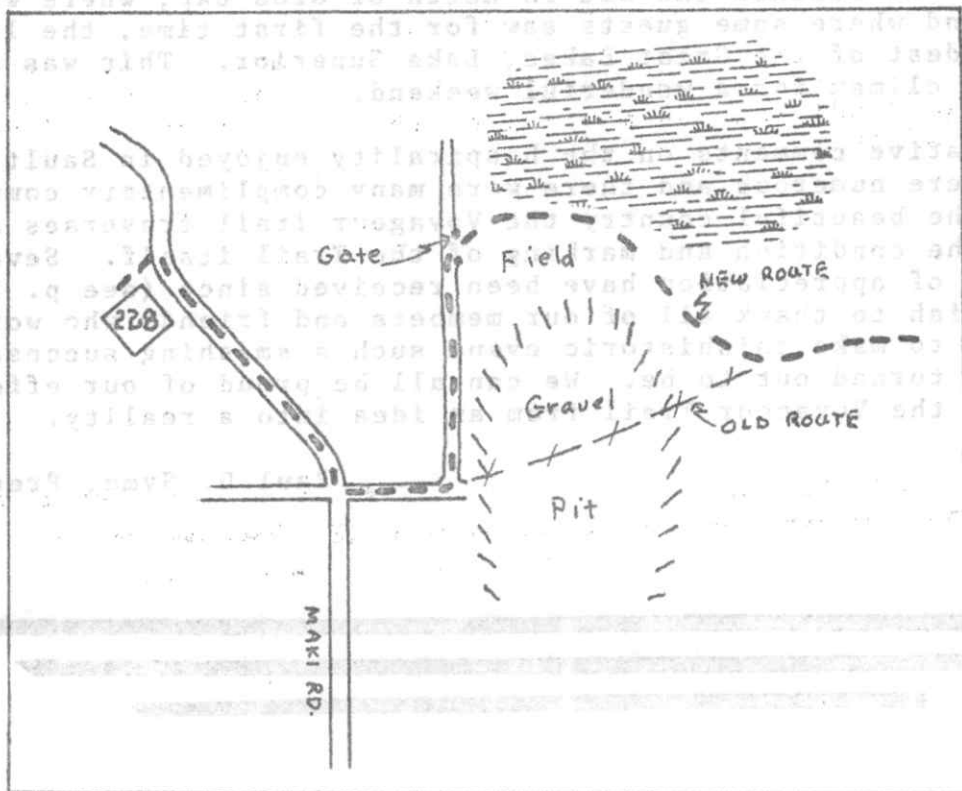
The Echo Ridges Section of the Voyageur Trail has been measured and described. Editing and map-making will be done this winter and the description should be mailed next spring in time for summer hiking. This Section links the Saulteaux and Desbarats Sections, and will give a description to guidebook holders of continuous trail from Gros Cap to just north of Rydal Bank.

NOTICE

GUIDE BOOK OWNERS

Please make the following correction on page S4, Saulteaux Section, and on the accompanying map S2. At 22.8 km, the Trail turns SE on Maki Road and after 0.5 km, takes a road E. Follow this to the gravel pit and turn N on a dirt road. After almost 0.5 km, the Trail leaves the road E through a gate into a field. Walk around the N edge of the field and behind (N) of the gravel pits and back into the bush. Here, the Trail climbs a short steep hill and shortly joins the original route. See map below.

At this time, the route is blue flagged and partly cleared, but should present no real problem to travel. Blazing will be completed in the spring.
