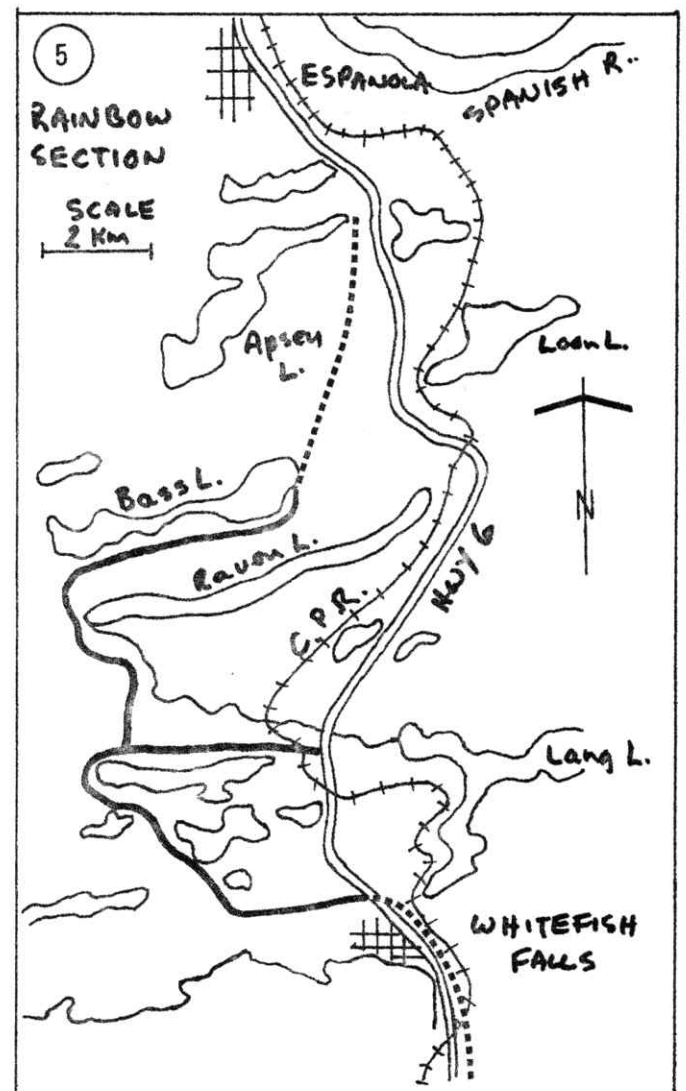
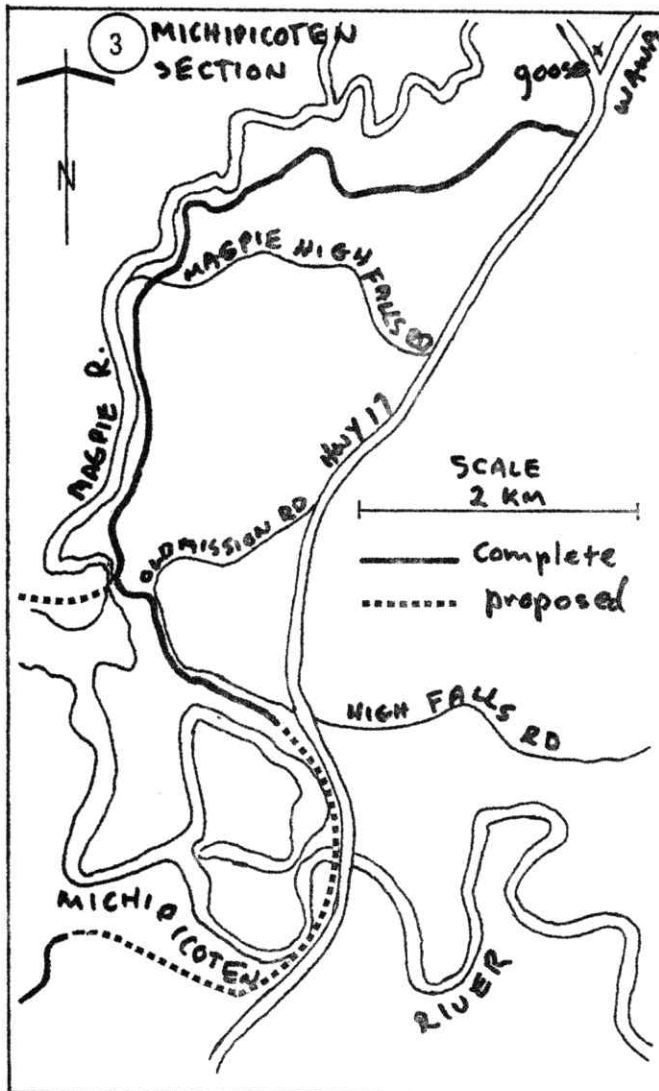
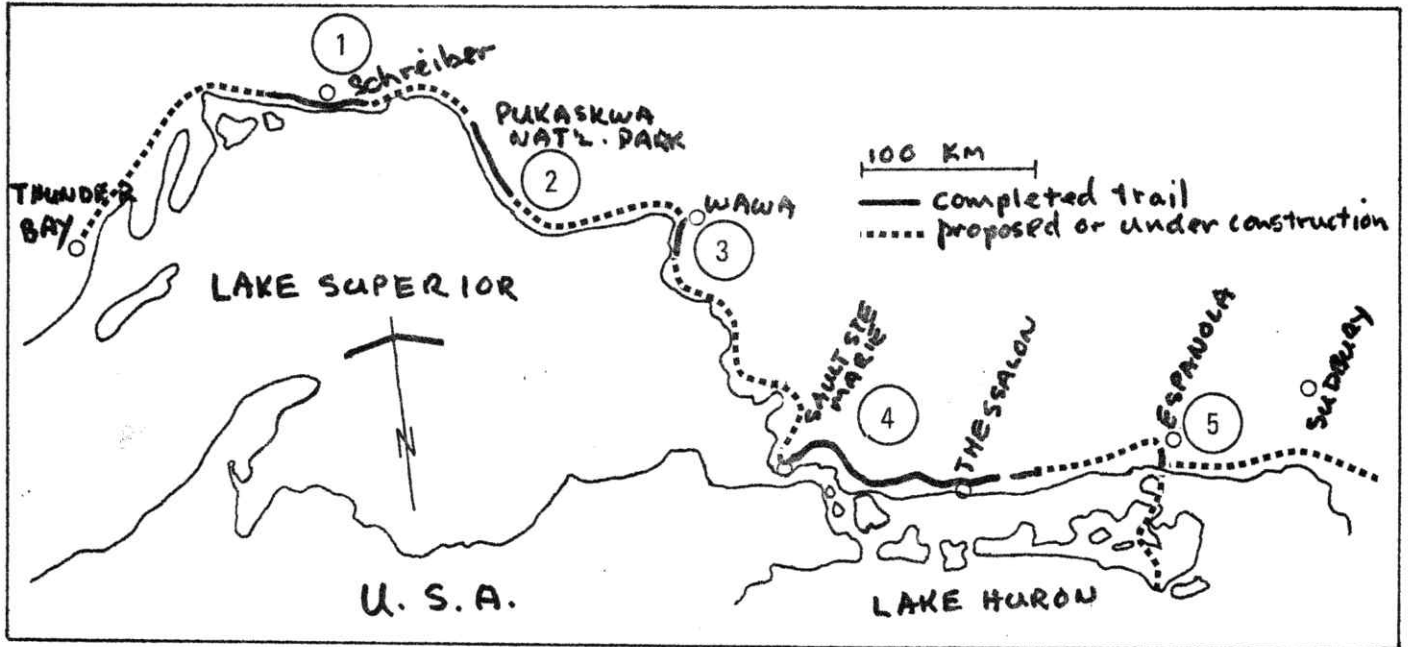
The Voyageur Trail will be closed along its entire length Monday, March 12, 1984.

STATUS OF THE TRAIL

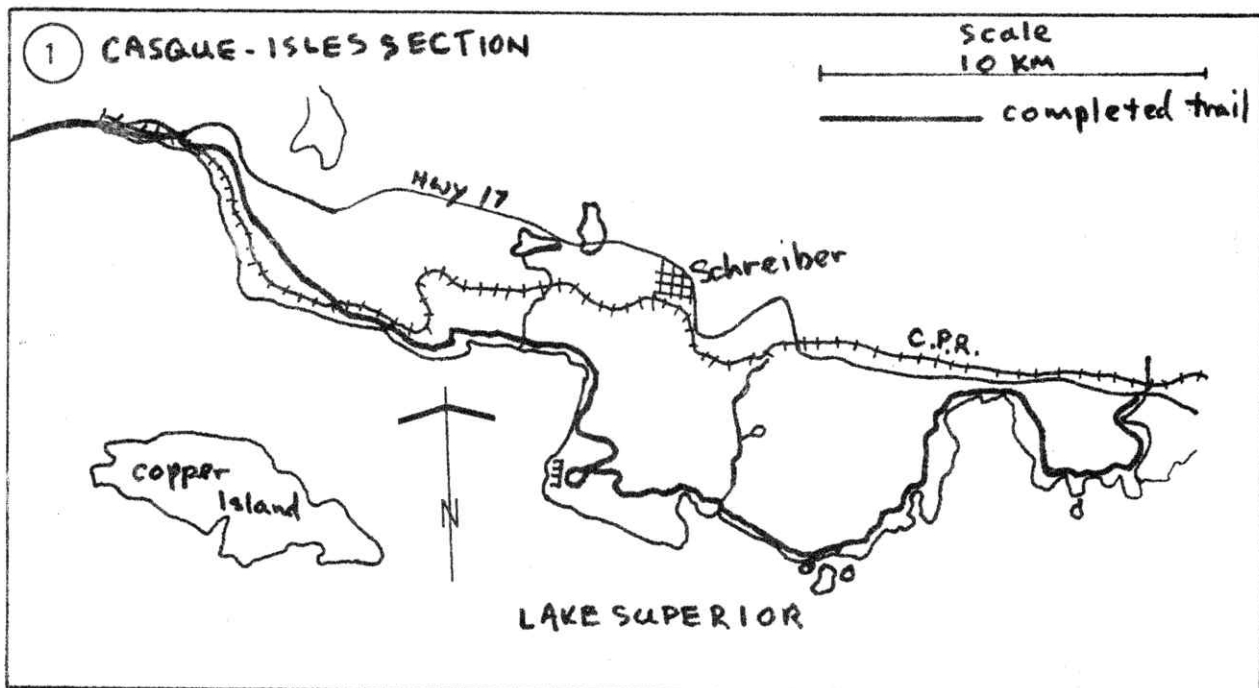
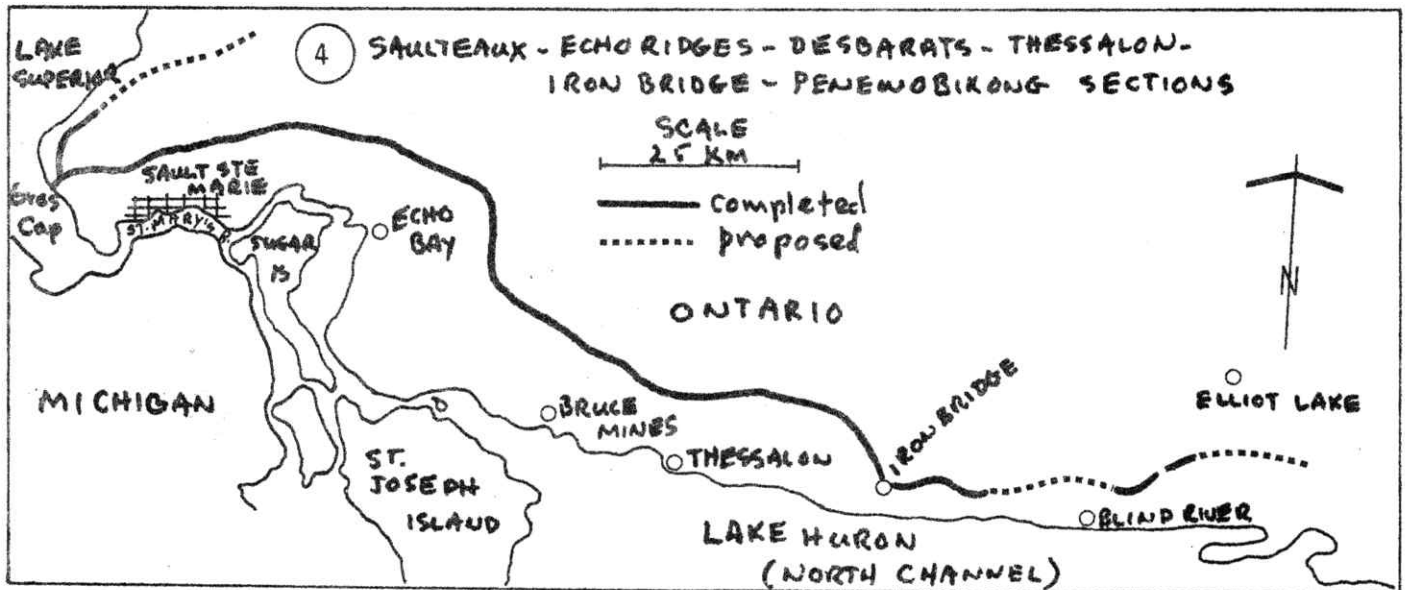
1. Casque-Isles Section: Between Terrace Bay and Rossport, approximately 50 km of shoreline hiking trail are completed and blazed. The part between Terrace Bay and Rainbow Provincial Park is described in the guidebook.
2. Pukaskwa National Park: Seventy kilometres of coastal hiking trail winds its way from Hattie Cove south through the boreal forest and over the hummocky volcanic rock of the Shield to the Swallow River. When completed to the Pukaskwa River, we will include this in our guidebook. For further information, contact the Superintendent, Pukaskwa National Park, P.O. Box 550, Marathon, Ont., P0T 2E0.
3. Michipicoten Section: Approximately 10 km of trail from Highway 17 near the goose to the bridge at the Michipicoten River and Hwy. 17, and beyond, is completed. Work continues south towards Lake Superior Provincial Park.
4. Saulteaux-Echo Ridges-Desbarats-Thessalon-Iron Bridge-Penewobikong Sections: There is complete and continuous trail from Gros Cap, west of Sault Ste. Marie, to the town of Iron Bridge. This comprises 137 km plus approximately 50 km of the Thessalon Section, which is being mapped and will be ready for the guidebook next fall. About 18 km of the Iron Bridge and Penewobikong Sections are completed and the rest is under construction. Going north from Gros Cap, there are approximately 9 km completed.
5. Rainbow Section: Although there are approximately 20 km of trail completed south of Espanola, there has been no activity in recent years and that section has not expanded. Some of it may be in poor shape and we cannot recommend it for hiking.

Thus, there are approximately 360 or so kilometres of the Voyageur Trail completed and hikeable, for an average of about 36 km per year of our existence. Good work!

A NEW JOB

It is with much trepidation that I take on the job as the new President of the Voyageur Trail Association. The time and effort that Paul Syme has put in during the last ten years, has been outstanding, and I can not hope, nor will I even attempt to fill his shoes. I am going to need a lot of help from other members to take over the work that was done by Paul.

The main priorities that I believe we must see to are:

- 1) Reclearing the present trail where necessary, to a point where the average hiker will not get lost.
- 2) Describing and mapping the trail that has already been built, but not yet described in the guide book.
- 3) Have more hikers use the trail.
- 4) Expand the trail.

Some of the trail that was once cleared and blazed, is now very difficult to follow for a number of reasons such as logging, windfalls, growth of underbrush, and weathering of blazes. The best answer to this problem is to have members who conscientiously maintain a section of the trail, and who ask for help from the club if there is a problem too big for them to handle alone. Some members are doing an excellent job, but there are many sections that have no one maintaining them. Work parties are needed for the bad sections, so please give your support when asked.

The guide book covers the section from Gros Cap to just past Ottetail Lake, and from Terrace Bay to Rainbow Falls Provincial Park. There is also a guide to the Pukaskwa Coastal Hiking Trail issued by Parks Canada. A guide is still required for the trail from Wawa to the Lake Superior Provincial Park boundary, from Ottetail Lake to Iron Bridge, and from Terrace Bay to Rossport. Some of this measuring, mapping and describing are already in progress.

To get more hikers to use the trail requires more publicity, and more organized hikes - from the Sunday afternoon stroll to the back-packing weekend. Tom Allinson will be organizing a lot more trail activities in the Sault Ste. Marie area in 1984, so watch out for details in the Voyageur Trail News.

If you are one of those members who use the trail,

don't keep quiet about it - tell your friends, - tell the Voyageur Trail News, and maybe even the local paper. If you had difficulty following the trail, please contact your local club or the Association, describing the problem. Ideally, volunteer to lead a work party to go back to the area, to cure the problem.

There has been a tremendous effort put into building the trail that we already have, and with a little more effort we will have a trail that is second to none. Please give us your full support.

Conservation and Hiking in South Africa

"The trails era has hit Southern Africa and hiking is now the fastest growing outdoor activity among South Africans and no wonder - discovering nature on foot takes a lot of beating." This statement from a June 1, 1983 South African newspaper indicates just what has happened in that country in the past decade concerning recreational hiking. The first hiking trails were opened in 1973, and a National Hiking Way Board was established in 1975. At present there are some 1000 km of trails under the control of the Boards, 'ranging in setting from Karoo landscapes to Cape and Natal mountains and from flat grasslands to evergreen forests'. Conservation areas without trails these days are exceptional; some trails are nature walks for day use only, others are long distance hutted routes. The State controlled conservation areas feel very strongly about trails and their use in environmental education, and as a means of gaining public support from citizens when conservation areas are threatened by developers. Jaynee Levy has described over 300 hiking routes in her book Everyone's Guide to Trailing and Mountaineering in Southern Africa. Let's hope the South Africans can keep up the momentum - they certainly have a beautiful country in which to tramp.

FOHTA Initiatives in 1983

1. A future-planning committee has defined new priorities for FOHTA, namely GOVERNMENT RELATIONS, PUBLIC RELATIONS and VOLUNTEERISM.
2. Mr. W. THORSTEINSON was hired to work on the first phase of the Volunteer/ Executive development project. A questionnaire was prepared and circulated "to a random selection of representatives of government, public organizations and members of related Associations regarding FOHTA's role." The questionnaires have been analysed and a full report has been forwarded to the FOHTA board of directors for discussion.
3. Funds have been secured for subsidizing the costs of printing and mailing newsletters which incorporate "FOHTA OUTLOOK". Details are available from club FOHTA representatives. The Ministry of Tourism and Recreation have very kindly helped out with financial support in the past year.
4. A WINTARIO grant of \$1300 has been received and will be used to subsidize costs incurred by FOHTA members clubs who participated in the 1983 GO TO BLAZES DAY.
5. Thanks, primarily, to Ross McLean, an Ontario-wide GO TO BLAZES DAY was held.
6. A panel display and slide show were completed and are being put to good use around the province.

Sentiers Quebec. La Federation Quebecoise de la Marche

National Trail Association of Canada

The November 1983 newsletter of the NTAC announces that an application to Fitness Canada for a national meeting has been accepted, the meeting to be held in Ottawa in the new year. The purpose of the meeting is to explore proposals for a walking trail spanning the country; a tentative route has already been mapped out. Free Admission to Provincial Parks on Civic Holiday

The Ministry of Natural Resources has a Bicentennial New Year's gift for the people of Ontario. There will be no day-use admission charge at Ontario's provincial parks on Monday August 6, 1984 - the Civic Holiday. And many parks will have even more to offer that day -- Bicentennial events ranging from public picnics to historical demonstrations and pageants.

The Bicentennial holds special significance for two of Ontario's provincial parks. It marks the first full year of operation for Frontenac Provincial Park in eastern Ontario, and the 75th anniversary of the Quetico Provincial Park in north-western Ontario.

Frontenac Provincial Park, a 70-square-kilometre park 30 km north of Kingston, officially opened in 1983. The rocky, lake-studded park has about 100 km of hiking trails, 40 km of canoe routes, and is renowned for its excellent lake trout, brook trout, northern pike and bass fishing.
