


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

Remember - this is a volunteer organization, and only with our members volunteering will the work get done and the club continue.



There are some members who quite often ski mid-week (during the day). They mainly do backcountry skiing. If you would care to join them, phone Tom Allinson at 942-0768.



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### VTA PARTICIPATES IN COMMUNITY CLUB AWARDS

If you are a member of the Voyageur Trail Association living in the Sault Ste Marie area, please read and consider this announcement carefully.

The Voyageur Trail Association has been registered in the Community Club Awards program (CCA). CCA operates in many cities to promote local businesses and volunteer organizations. The result is publicity for the businesses and a flow of money from the businesses to the volunteer organizations. CCA requires a host sponsor in each community. In Sault Ste Marie, radio station CKCY has agreed to host the program, and will contribute a lot of work. The VTA has the opportunity to obtain several hundred dollars (realistically out of a pot of over \$10,000) for very little effort.




# TRAIL MIX

Steve Taylor noted on a recent trip to Australia that the Aussies have come up with an interesting solution to the problem of erosion caused by hiking trails. In Mount Kosciusko National Park, footpaths were being worn into fragile alpine meadows hikers. Five kiby lometers of trail was made from raised steel This trail was exgrates. tremely easy to walk on, and you would never get lost. If the Voyageur Trail Association can come up with a large amount of funding from somewhere, Algoma Steel would have a major

contract to supply grating to stretch from Manitoulin Island to Thunder Bay. One person did point out a problem with this metal trail. It seems that it is a bit dangerous in electrical storms.

Hike Ontario has opened its Walking Centre in Toronto and has appointed Geoffrey Dewar as Executive Director. With the official opening on Jan 2, Hike Ontario can now more effectively be a focal point for enquiries about walking and hiking in the province. Hike Ontario is the umbrella organization for long distance trails in Ontario, and these two recent developments will probably result in direct benefits to the Voyageur Trail Association, especially in terms of publicity outside of northern Ontario. Funding came from the Ministry of Tourism and Recreation and from the Richard Ivey Foundation.

The Voyageur Trail will be closed on April 6, 1992. We have to do this once every year. We are told that we must do this one day a year so that our landowners maintain legal control of the land along the trail.



Many of us have always viewed membership in the VTA from the social aspect. Aside from enjoying our beautiful trail, many of us take the opportunity to meet and make new friends. I guess it worked for two of our members. Betty Nassoiy tells us that MAUREEN DELANEY and JOHN LEHMAN tied the knot on December 27, 1991.

Another recent phenomenon in our club has been how many of our members have decided to increase the membership by CREATING new members. # NEW YEAR'S CELEBRATION ON THE LAKE

Originally it was to take place in the Mile Hill area, but insufficient snowfall forced a relocation. Our new location to snowshoe was Nettleton Lake west. We called lunch at East Davington Creek. Seats were improvised using snowshoes except for Bill and I who brought our own in our backpacks. Once finished eating we crossed the creek. The crossing was a bit treacherous as the bridge had a few gaps between the logs. Betty slipped through a gap, dropping her snowshoes on the thin ice. After extricating herself, she somehow had to get them back. The ice was too thin to walk on, so she tried to fish them off with a ski pole, nearly taking an icy plunge in the process.

Just before leaving the creek Susan announced that she will soon have a new addition to her family, a baby expected in July after sixteen years of marriage, as well as an addition to their house, to be build this summer.

There were a few fallen trees across the trail and some brush choking it. It seems that Pat is always armed with pruning shears and a bow saw, as he deployed them at these obstacles.

### ELLIOT LAKE

The Coureur de Bois section of the VTA sponsored the October meeting of the VTA, including an afternoon hike. Since Pim and I are not members of the executive, we took the opportunity to explore the VTA trail around Elliot Lake while the executive met in the morning. Very nice trail (although the weather was dreary) with lovely scenery. The trail crosses a new logging road near the highway, which has a few pitfalls for the unwary, mostly deep mud. We took a side trail up to a small lake and waded through the beaver swamp at the wet end, took some pictures, and returned to Elliot Lake in time to go on the afternoon hike.

The "big" hike on the agenda followed the new ski trails and the downhill ski area at Elliot Lake -- quite an extensive set of trails, which seem just a bit longer on foot than on skis! Downhill slopes are REALLY interesting with no snow on them!

The trails are very well marked, and meander amongst the remains of a considerable amount of mining activity, including a toxic lake (very pretty blue) and a log drain pipe. We climbed up the steep hill to the new visitor's center and old fire tower, which provide a very nice over-view of Elliot Lake and surrounding area. The trail follows the top edge of the cliff for a distance, giving a nice view of the "toxic" lake at the bottom

# VOLUNTEERS AND FUNDING SOURCES WORTHY OF RECOGNITION

1991 was a busy year for the Voyageur Trail. We received funding for trail improvements in the Coureur de Bois Section (Elliot Lake) and in the Casque Isles Section (Terrace Bay to Rainbow Falls) and for computerization and updating of our landowner files. The funding for these sources was obtained under the title Summer Project 1991. It appears that Summer Project 1991 was a success and the sources of funding plus the work of several volunteers must be recognized.

At the October Annual Meeting, the Board decided to recognize the work of three volunteers.

Peter Stinnissen has been instrumental in obtaining funding for several projects over the past few years. He has also helped orchestrate the work done over the past two years in the Casque Isles Section. Pete has demonstrated once again that he is a key person in the Voyageur Trail Association.

> Peter could not be in Terrace Bay all summer. and in the past year there were some early problems created by inadequate supervision. Lorne Bourke has always held a keen interest in the trail here and has put in a lot of work. This summer, he put in a huge effort towards helping to keep this project on track. Keep up the good work Lorne. The trail in your area is continuing to improve. Word of its spectacular nature should spread so that many people will use it in the future.

> > Jesse Latendresse took the project to heart in the Coureur de Bois Section. He put in many hours and was a major reason why this project was a major success. Over the past few years, this trail has become a 'must' for anyone looking for a 3 day wilderness backpacking trip. Keep up the good work Jesse.

There are others worth mentioning. Pete King has helped in the Casque Isles Section. Jack Smit has always been on the go for the trail around Elliot Lake. Steve

Taylor wrote some of the proposals, worked on the final reports, and oversaw much of the summer work.



The Corporation of the City of Elliot Lake, the Corporation of the Township of Terrace Bay and the Sault and Region Conservation Authority all sponsored some of the work done last summer. Their contribution was required for the project to succeed.

Funding came from three sources. Most of the labour funding came from the Ontario Government's Youth Corps Program. Mountain Equipment Co-operative provided much of the operating budget and funding to hire Tim Yanni for the landowner records and trail descriptions. Remember this as you stroll amongst the fine outdoor gear in MEC's Toronto, Calgary or Vancouver outlets. Also notice the amount of MEC gear on any Voyageur Trail Outing.

The remainder of the funding for the operating budget and for the Landowner records update came from Shell's Environmental Fund, which has provided funding for a number of projects promoting environmental awareness and friendliness throughout the country.
