### NIPIGON RIVER RECREATION TRAIL OFFICIALLY OPENED

On a bright, sunny Saturday morning (Sept. 23, 1995) in Nipigon, **Economic Development Officer** Bruce Pritchard emceed ceremonies marking the official opening of the Nipigon River Recreation Trail joining Nipigon and Red Rock. Local and regional politicians, reeves, business and government officials were given an opportunity to speak to the crowd of about 150 gathered at the Nipigon Marina. Steve Dominy and Gayle Phillips represented the Voyageur Trail Association, with Steve nailing up Voyageur Trail logos on the signs at each end of the trail and formally announcing the inclusion of the trail in our northern Ontario system. Gayle and Steve stayed for a barbeque lunch and a hike along the trail, and were later rewarded with a certificate of achievement for their efforts.

The eight km trail (plus side trails) has been constructed to the highest standards, using gravel, wood chips, bridges and even a causeway. It follows the scenic Nipigon River, and hikers are rewarded with beautiful views over the river and Nipigon Bay. A full colour brochure describing the trail is available from the VTA upon request. #### THE EXCURSION TO CLIMB JACOB'S LADDER by Pim Delfgou

A dozen enthusiastic trekkers assembled outside the Red Lobster on a beautiful autumn Sunday and headed north to Batchewana Mountain. We ventured off the highway past Chippewa Falls on a logging road. The road started innocently enough, but became rougher until we reached a point that we all had to pile into Gary Koteles' truck to reach the base of the hill. Bushwhacking was the order of the day for there were no established trails. Gary led us up the hill, but we were left wondering why we had to carry pressure treated 2x4s with us. We noticed he had this monster backpack on and wondered if he was going to build a house on the summit.

We ploughed through the thick underbrush, and an hour later reached the summit. At this point, Gary proceeded to unload his tools and more lumber and started to build a ladder while the rest of us showed more common sense and had lunch, soaking in the warm sunshine.

Once the ladder was complete, we all climbed to the top. We could see quite some distance to Lake Superior as well as Turkey Lake and the Batchewana River. We even caught a glimpse of the old Tribag Mine.

We took a roundabout way back down to the road when we followed the wrong flagging tape and wound up on a watershed study line. Nevertheless, we made it back safe and sound. We stopped on the road and took a look back at "Jacob's Ladder' standing out over the hill as a monument to our visit. We wondered what future visitors to the area will say when they see this strange thing on the hill.

#### NEW GUIDEBOOK ALMOST COMPLETE by Steve Dominy Chair, Guidebook Committee

By the time you read this, the new, greatly improved 3rd edition of the Voyageur Trail Guidebook will be undergoing final proofing before going to the printer. A binder format has been chosen which will permit ease of updating as updates are produced. Also the individual, twocolour maps can be removed, placed in a plastic ziplock bag and put in your pocket for the day's outing. There is no need to carry the entire binder with you. Our intention is to make the guidebook available to non-members, at a premium price, through book stores and outdoor equipment suppliers.

Activities undertaken on this project in 1995 included: 1) conducting an audit of most trail access points to ensure that they are in good condition; 2) securing an agreement with Geomatics Canada to reproduce topographic maps; 3) hosting trail volunteers from southern Ontario and Britain who completed the Goulais River Section; 4) measuring several re-routes and the new Marathon Coastal Trail; 5) arranging to use the mapping software, computer and printer at the Clean North office in Sault Ste. Marie; 6) purchasing building materials, hand tools and a motorized brush saw for trail clearing; 7) constructing a boardwalk and steps using pressure-treated lumber. In early 1996, a full-colour brochure\* will be produced to advertise the new trail guide and entice new members to join, and trail signs will be made.

Generous support for the production of the guidebook and related trail improvements has been received from the following sources: Mountain Equipment Co-op (\$5,000), Laidlaw Foundation (\$5,000), Laidlaw Foundation (\$5,000), Charles Ivy Foundation (through Hike Ontario) (\$750), and Human Resources Development Canada (HRDC) (\$5,895). Under the Section 25 program, the HRDC funds supported the

#### **HIKE THE "WILD** SHORE OF AN INLAND SEA"

Located 30 minutes east of Marathon, Ontario, Pukaskwa National Park offers hikers the opportunity to explore a spectacular landscape, revealed in vistas of Lake Superior, Canadian Shield and northern forest. The spirit of wildness envelopes those who choose to visit and explore this special place. Like all other national parks in Canada, Pukaskwa's purpose is to protect this area, with all the natural and

cultural features intact, forever.

Pukaskwa conducts and sponsors scientific research which increases the understanding of the park's ecosystem. Of special interest are the rare Woodland Caribou. At minimum the current population is 6, but in the past there have been as many as 31 caribou in the park.

One of the largest ongoing research projects is the Pukaskwa Predator Prey Process Project, called the P5. This project studies the interactions between moose, wolf and caribou, and how they use habitats in and around the park. Other research projects examine components of the ecosystem, such as lakes, forest fire patterns and archaeological features.

Hattie Cove is the centre for most park activities, and is located 25 km east of Marathon, on Highway 627 15 km from the Highway 17 turnoff. Here you will find a 67 site campground with hot showers, flush toilets and electrical sites. Near this campground, there are several beaches, and short scenic hiking trails along the Lake Superior shoreline, or leading to scenic viewpoints and inland lakes.

Experienced adventurers can travel into the backcountry and explore the 60 km Coastal Hiking Trail. The backcountry of Pukaskwa is a rugged wilderness and visitors must register with the park before departing into the backcountry. There are limits on the number of parties permitted in the backcountry, so hikers are advised to call ahead to purchase trail permits and reserve their trip.

Proposed fees for 1996 are: PERSONAL USE (DAY USE): \$3.00/ adult, \$1.50/student, \$2.25/senior citizen, free/children under 6. HATTIE COVE: Campsite reservation: \$6.00/night, Electrical campsite: \$18.00/night, Regular campsite: \$15.00/night, Off-season: \$10.00/night

BACKCOUNTRY: Backcountry Registration: \$6.00/party, Developed campsite: \$5.00/person/night, Nondeveloped campsite: \$3.00/person/ night

The park is open year-round, and services are available in the Hattie Cove campground May - September.

After a very pleasant chat and lunch at the Ropke's, the rain finally stopped. The remaining 8 hardy hikers went on a shorter hike than originally planned in the Gordon Lake area. We took off our hats to all our Landowners who so graciously allow our trail to be built on their property (see page 1). As always it was a pleasure to hike with Dieter and Erika where there is always good conversation and lessons to be learned about the natural environment.

We won't name the missing hikers (to protect the guilty), but we soon learned that they had high tailed it to the nearest donut shop rather than brave the elements. They obviously had not realized that we hardier souls are not too easily put off by the weather. We are not quite as hardy (or fool hardy) as some British hikers. Their philosophy is to hike as planned no matter what the weather because, as they said, if we wait for good weather in the Lake District, we might have to wait for years to go outside.

Interestingly enough a similar situation occurred two weeks later on October 14th when again a number of people who had planned on hiking decided to stay home rather than brave the elements. Again the original schedule was



changed from near Prince Lake to the Red Rock area where the trail would be dryer, and the rain held off from the time we left the vehicles to our return. One highlight was we created our own board walk - picking up planks from the shore to put on the trail on a particularly wet area. Therefore, the next time there is an outing when the weather is not the best, why not join the WHIMPS. Although we may not complete the hike as originally scheduled, we almost always do hike, ski or snowshoe and still have time to have a donut afterwards which we can eat without guilt.



#### ANNUAL REPORT - 1995 by Steve Dominy, **Out-Going President**

As outgoing president, I would like to summarize what has been a very busy and productive year for the Association. Significant progress was made in revitalizing and establishing clubs, namely in the Elliot Lake, Blind River, and Terrace Bay areas. Membership numbers are at one of their highest levels, and still rising, thanks in large part to the efforts of our energetic and creative Publicity Director. Over 5000 brochures were distributed throughout Ontario and Michigan in 1995, a Hikers' Hotline was established, and our display was set up in a variety of venues.

We hosted a group of eight trail

builders from southern Ontario and Britain, organized by Jill Leslie of Hike Ontario. Thanks to the advance efforts of Patrick Capper, Tom Allinson, Betty Nassoiy, Gayle Phillips, Susan Graham and myself, the group completed the Goulais River Section. Two additional segments were added to our system through agreements with local groups, being the

Marathon Coastal Trail and the Nipigon River Recreation Trail. The Casque Isles Section was also expanded and improved this year, through efforts coordinated by the Terrace Bay Recreation Office. Regular trail maintenance was conducted on most, but unfortunately not all the trail. A mini tornado touched down on parts of the Echo Ridges Section, necessitating a major effort for the Saulteaux Club. The Thessalon Section west of Highway 129, badly in need of a major refurbishing, was not completed and will have to be a priority after spring thaw.

In addition to stepping in as president after Steve Taylor's untimely death, I also inherited the position of Guidebook Committee Chair. Securing funding for the new guidebook and related trail improvements and measuring became a priority, and the committee was successful in raising over \$21,000 for the project through grants from a variety of agencies. Volunteers have helped or will help measure and describe trail, make signs, map re-routes, and numerous other tasks.

A final task was to initiate a strategic planning exercise, with the intent of helping the VTA focus future efforts on areas of member priority. Gayle Phillips and I developed a questionnaire which was vetted by the VTA Executive. I will remain on the committee to develop a plan for the future of our Association.

I wish to thank all the Executive for their support and assistance throughout this busy year. To all our volunteers, I would like to personally thank you for your contributions in 1995. Together we accomplished a great deal, and I am sure that under the guidance of our new President Larry Gringorten we will continue to make a significant contribution to hiking in Ontario.

### THE SHELL ENVIRONMENTAL FUND AND THE NIGERIA ISSUE by Larry Gringorten

Since the recent executions of nine minority-rights activists in Nigeria by the military junta, Shell International has come under increased criticism for its perceived role in that country's problems and its continuing cooperation with a brutally repressive regime. The nine (including Nobel literature nominee, Ken Saro-Wiwa) were from Ogoniland, a small region in the fertile Niger delta of southeastern Nigeria, and had been campaigning against the government's appropriation of their land for oil production and the widespread environmental damage that Shell's operations were causing in the region. In hindsight, therefore, it was inevitable that objections would be raised by some of our members over new that the VTA had received a grant from Shell Canada's Environmental Fund (see the announcement in this newsletter) and, indeed, this has been the case with some who received advanced notice of the grant.

My purpose in addressing the issue here is to acknowledge these objections, to bring the matter to the attention of all members and to inform you of our present position vis-à-vis Shell and the grant. First, it goes without saying that acceptance of the money from Shell Canada should not be interpreted as a VTA endorsement of the parent company's activities in developing countries. The grant application was submitted long before the Nigerian problem became widely publicized and the award was

subsequently accepted without conscious knowledge of the parent company's activities in Ogoniland. From a practical standpoint, the grant had already been fully incorporated into the current year's budget and financial commitments made before a potential conflict of interest was suggested. Moreover, part of the money has already been spent. Short of a request to VTA members for contributions equivalent to the grant that could be given back to Shell, it is no longer possible to return it.

The problem and our future involvement with Shell will be tabled for discussion at the next executive meeting in February. By that time, I expect to have a response from the company to my request for answers to the accusations against Shell International on its environmental record, as well as a policy statement concerning its future intentions in Ogoniland. Needless to say, the VTA should have promotional ties only to reputable corporate citizens and make every attempt to avoid links to environmentally uncaring companies. Perhaps this is one situation that slipped through the cracks, but it may be prudent to withhold definitive judgement until Shell has had a chance to respond.

Meanwhile, I invite members to comment on this issue in the enclosed questionnaire. Your opinions on this and replies to other questions are vital to guiding the executive in policy decisions that accurately reflect the collective will of the membership.

## The Trail User's Code

- Leave flowers and plants for others to enjoy.
- Do not damage live trees or strip off bark.
- Protect and do not disturb wildlife.
- Keep dogs on a leash, especially on or near farmland and in parks.
- Respect the privacy of people living along the trail. Walk around the edges of fields, not across them.

• Leave only your thanks and take nothing but photographs. BE A LOW-IMPACT HIKER!
